
We hope 2022 will be kind and allow us to do as many activities as possible. Stay safe and happy 2022!!!



Last year we engaged pupils in different activities. 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CONSERVING THE ENVIRONMENT

Environmental conservation is the practice of saving the environment from the loss of species, and the destruction of the ecosystem, primarily due to pollution and human activities. Conservation is vital in saving and helping both animals and trees as we are all dependent on one another for survival. Below are some of the ways to conserve the environment.

STOP DESTROYING BIRD HOMES

There are so many ways in which bird homes are destroyed and one of them is deforestation. Deforestation is the cutting down of trees or the clearing of forests. Throughout history, forests have been destroyed to make space for agriculture, animal grazing, to obtain wood for fuel, manufacturing, and construction. Charcoal production is one of the major contributors to deforestation in Zambia.

Cutting down trees causes habitat loss for birds and other animal species. It destroys the food and shelter for living organisms which leads to biodiversity loss and also leaves the soil vulnerable to erosion making it unsuitable for both plant and animal life.

Deforestation is also one of the major causes of climate change. Climate change is the long-term shift in global or regional weather patterns, which in the long run leads to droughts, floods, wildfires, and many more.

Deforestation can be tackled by planting new trees to replace those that have been cut or planting trees in already existing forests to help maintain the forest cover. Awareness-raising and sensitization campaigns can also help reduce deforestation. This can also be done by encouraging eco-friendly practices, for example, making fuel from organic waste products.

This year we will be planting trees and raising awareness of people on the importance of planting trees. Get ready environmental ambassadors!

A WORLD IN OUR BACKYARD

In our daily lives, we depend on functional ecosystems to have all the good ecosystem services we need. There are many different ecosystems and one of them is a wetland.

A wetland is an area of land that is covered by water either seasonally or permanently. The ground in a wetland is saturated, or full of water, while the surrounding ground is covered with shallow water.



Wetlands are usually classified as swamps, floodplains, and Dambos and they both have soils that contain minerals that are important to plants in the ecosystem. Wetlands are home to a variety of plants, birds, and animals. A wetland system can also prevent soil erosion, purify waters, prevent floods, and restore underground water supplies, thereby improving ecosystem services.





Therefore, wetlands being a world in our backyards, we all need to understand how important wetlands are to the health of our environment and protect them. Wetlands provide food as well as water to human beings. They also help clean the atmosphere as they increase carbon sequestration and increase the levels of oxygen.


THREATS FACED BY BIRDS

There are many threats that birds face such as deforestation, killings pollution, and fire. Hope Lungu of AEP had something to say about deforestation as it is one of the major threats faced by birds.

"Deforestation is the cutting down and burning of trees. Deforestation has many negative impacts on the environment. A good example is when charcoal burners and farmers cut down trees. When trees are cut, birds are left homeless because they have no place to build nests, therefore affecting the birds' ability to reproduce effectively.

Killing birds for food reduces the number of birds. This is also a threat faced by birds because it leads to a shortage of certain birds.



Burning of the forest is usually done by farmers. When farmers are planting their crops, they clear their fields by burning the fields. This leads to a shortage of food for birds because on the farm there are seeds and organisms that birds feed on.

Finally, if people can stop deforestation, birds can have a place to sleep. If people can stop killing birds, we can have a huge number of different kinds of birds. If people can stop burning forests and fields, and start planting trees to maintain the ecosystem, we can have enough homes and food for birds."


